We came to this pretty place

some 10-12 days ago, where we
intend to remain until we
can go south. Carver is too
not before middle of October.
We have the Emperor and
Empress of Germany here
now, they always come at this
time to visit their only
daughter, the Grand Duchess
of Baden, she, the Grand-
Duchess is the daughter of the
wife of my beloved Crown
Prince of Sweden, and
also to be present at the great
Races which take place here
about the beginning of October,
when the Russian officers
ride horse races and
fences, and such like. We

expect in a few days Mr. Emil
here. he has come over to Europe
have the Cap on a visit of a
few months - I wonder how
he looks now. - The weather
has now become cool - and
a blessing it is for we have
been living in tropical
heat - except 2 or 3 weeks -
ever since I left home -
what a difference there is in the
climate between England and
the Continent - here the natural
state of the sun is to shine -
in England she is too shy -
and must be seen by us poor
mortals - what a pity it is.
We travelled through the black
forest on our way here. a wonder-
ful country. rolling wet hills, hills
and through all these thousands
